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PSC detentions fall despite fleet growth

The Liberian Registry is proud of its reputation for quality, efficiency, safety and innovative service. And it is proud of the fact that it consistently appears on the prestigious White Lists of all the leading port state control and other ship vetting organisations throughout the world. The recently released reports of the United States Coast Guard, and the Tokyo and Paris MoUs on Port State Control for 2009 are no exception, and provide further conclusive proof that Liberia is the world's premier open ship registry.

Despite the continued impressive growth in the size of the Liberian

fleet over the past year, the number of Port State Control detentions of Liberian vessels actually fell in 2009 compared to the previous year. There were seven fewer Liberian-flag vessels detained under the Tokyo MOU, and the 46 Liberian vessels detained under the Paris MOU in 2009 was down on the 53 detained in 2008. The fact that, despite this improvement, the PARIS MoU excess factor for Liberia increased from -1.09 in 2008 to -1.01 in 2009 was due to a decline in the total number of detentions compared to examinations by the Paris MoU in 2009.

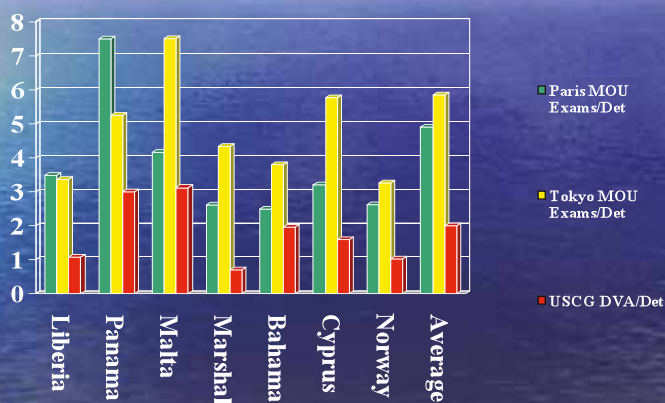
The number of USCG detentions, meanwhile, remained unchanged in 2009 but, because there were fewer distinct vessel arrivals, the percentage increased slightly, from 0.72 per cent to 0.73 per cent.

Liberian vessels fared very well in all PSC Concentrated Inspection Campaigns during the course of the year, and the Liberian Registry is participating in the Voluntary IMO Member State Audit Scheme which will help Liberian-flag vessels with the new Paris MoU risk-based PSC inspection programme which will replace the existing PSC regime on January 1, 2011.

Under the new inspection regime, quality ships will be rewarded with fewer inspections, while high-risk ships will be subject to more in-depth and more frequent inspections.

The introduction of the new regime will be accompanied by a new inspection system, THETIS, which will replace the existing database, and which will include, for the first time, the recording of port call information. Under the new regime, High-Risk Ships will be subject to an inspection interval of six months, while Standard-Risk Ships will fall within an inspection range of between ten and twelve months. For Low-Risk Ships, meanwhile, the inspection interval will be between 24 and 36 months of the last inspection.

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Record numbers for LISCR at Posidonia

Posidonia 2010 was a great success for the Liberian Registry, with record-breaking crowds of current and potential clients, visitors and friends attending the Registry's exhibition stand. Despite the global economic downturn, over 1,850 exhibitors from 87 different countries, and more than 17,000 trade visitors from all sectors of the maritime industry, attended this year's event.

The Liberian Registry had a great deal to celebrate at the 22nd convening of Posidonia. The highlights of the Registry's exhibit included displays of the registration certificate for the very first Liberian-flagged vessel issued on March 11, 1949 to the tanker *World Peace*, and for the 3000th vessel to be registered, the *Ise Princess*. Both of these ships were owned and operated by Greek shipowners. The Registry also celebrated the passing of the historic 100m gross tons mark.

The Liberian-flag fleet has grown to a record 3,311 ships, aggregating more than 105.5m gross tons. Indeed, at the halfway point for this year, the fleet has grown by 170 vessels aggregating 8.1 million gross tons, while at the same point in 2009 the growth was 117 vessels aggregating 4.6 million gt.

Posidonia is always a great opportunity for members of the Registry to visit and renew valued relationships with clients and friends at numerous festivities throughout the week. The Registry was honored to have the Commissioner of the Liberian Bureau of Maritime Affairs, Binyah Kesselly, and the Senior Deputy Commissioner, Margaret Ansumana, at this year's event, as well as LISCR's Chief Operating Officer, Scott Bergeron, Senior Vice President, Maritime Operations & Standards, Capt David Pascoe, Vice-President, Seafarers Certification Capt David Muir, and Managing Director for the Registry's Piraeus, Greece office, Michalis Pantazopoulos.

This year the Registry's exhibition stand featured an anti-piracy program demonstration. Liberia has taken a leading role in training seafarers and company security officers in the fight against piracy, which is currently plaguing the international shipping industry. Working with leading UK-based security adviser, Maritime Underwater &

Security Consultants (MUSC), Liberia has produced a Best Management Practice (BMP) program specifically designed for the use of merchant ships in the waters off Somalia. The Registry provided additional information on its BMP computer-based training course, while MUSC set-up a live, scaled-down version of its anti-piracy operations room at the Registry's booth.

Clients and visitors who attended Posidonia were also pleased to learn about the recent initiatives Liberia has undertaken. These include facilitating access to the advantageous loan rates that are available from the leading German ship finance banks, a pilot scheme to extend compulsory drydocking intervals to seven-and-a-half-year intervals, and a VOC Management Plan Review and Approval Service to help the tanker industry achieve compliance with impending air pollution legislation.



Onboard familiarisation for Liberian Registry staff

The Liberian Registry recently conducted its first commercial vessel familiarisation training exercise for staff members, at the North Locust Point Terminal, Baltimore, on board the cargo vessel *Harbel Cutlass*.

The purpose of the training exercise was to provide basic orientation and familiarisation for those LISCR staff without a maritime background, introducing them to basic ship

nomenclature, operations, administration, and manning organisation. The objective was to improve the staff's knowledge and appreciation of the importance of each person's job in the Registry.

Al Romero: Director, Quality Assurance & Training, Sean Brett: Marine Safety & Investigations Manager and Melissa Mejias: Certification Services Manager, acted as onboard supervisors to staff members Wendy O'Connor (Executive Assistant), Commerce Kee (Audit Co-ordinator), Kathy Griffin (Marine Safety Administrative Assistant), Sneha Sethi (Administrative Assistant), and Daniel Nguyen (Marine Safety and Investigation Co-ordinator).

The *Harbel Cutlass* is a general cargo vessel managed by New Jersey-based

Fairfield Maxwell Limited, with Chinese officers and crew. The LISCR group met with the master at the ship office, before being escorted to the bridge, where the various functions of the bridge equipment were explained. A tour was then undertaken of different areas of the accommodation, and the arrangement of the house and the crew was explained, as were the responsibilities and functions of all officers and crew.

The group was given a briefing on lifeboat launching procedures on the port-side boat-deck, and tours of the cargo holds, engine room, fire stations, mooring stations, steering gear room, emergency gear locker, galley, deck and engine stores. Prior to disembarking, the Registry's staff met with the vessel's DPA, William Tomalonis.



IMO bravery commendation for Liberian ship

The IMO Council Panel of Judges for the 2010 IMO Exceptional Bravery Award has confirmed that a Letter of Commendation will be

awarded to the master and crew of the Liberian-flag containership *Dorian*, who were nominated by Liberia, supported by Tanzania. Thanks to the



timely intervention of the *Dorian*, 77 people were rescued from the small coastal passenger/cargo ship *Ile D'Anjouan*, which was sinking in heavy weather in April 2009 about 120 miles south-east of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, in a high-risk piracy area. The IMO award presentation is due to take place later this year at the 88th session of the Maritime Safety Committee.

Plans are currently being developed to include the LISCR Peace and Charity Cup in the Liberia Football Association's national programme. The LISCR Trust Company wishes to work with LISCR F C in the near future to establish Liberia's first football academy. Ten acres of land have been secured in Liberia to facilitate this project.
